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## BOAT YARD APPRENTICE SCHOOL

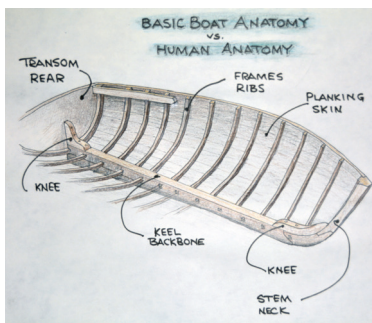
Museum-Based Workforce Development Education  
Leading to Entry-Level Boatyard Employment

At-risk youth are coming to the Museum to learn maritime skills through workforce development education, leading to entry level employment at local boat yards. The Museum is seeking grants and donations to fund the continuation of this program, which is also supported by membership fees. Arey's Pond Boat Yard has collaborated with the Museum to determine the specific skills necessary to earn the "Boat Yard Apprentice Certificate", enabling students to seek existing opportunities in the field of maritime employment. More importantly, this innovative program will provide students with the team work and communication skills necessary to excel in any work place environment, not just the marine trades. "We achieve this outcome for each student through the participation of both teachers and mentors in the boat shop classroom, where self-esteem building engagement is the first step in every interaction. ### ANATOMY OF A BOAT

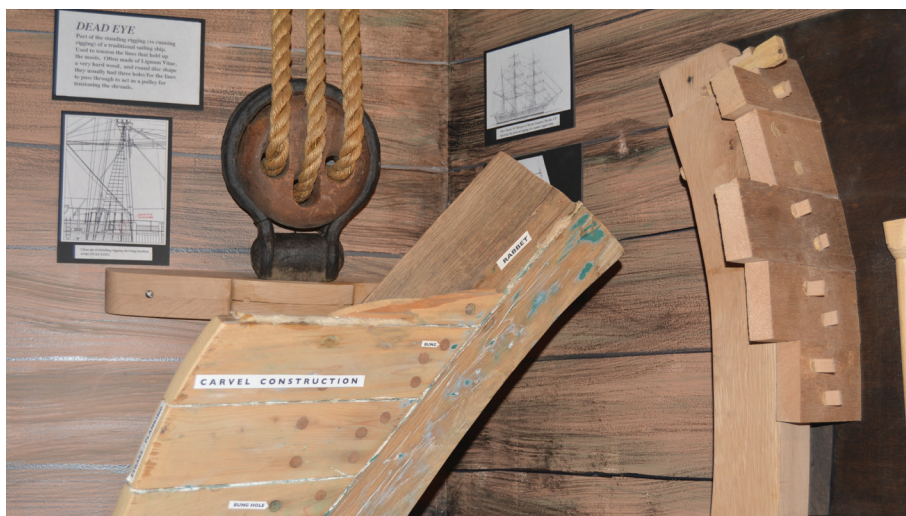

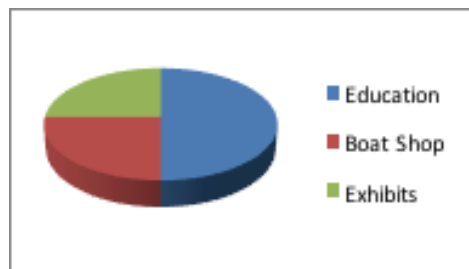
