HANKS TO A \$15 MILLION RENOVATION, the **Independence** Visitor Center, the official visitor center of greater Philadelphia and gateway to Independence National Historical Park, unveiled an informative, interactive and 21st century orientation experience in summer 2019. Included in these enhancements is a 42-foot, interactive digital wall-the city's largest. The immersive, multi-user experience engages visitors by displaying dynamic content about things to do in the region to explore via touchscreen. The digital Welcome Wall is just one facet of the Visitor Center's upgrades, which also include the first café by HERSHEY'S Kitchens, offering locally sourced, savory items and indulgent treats; a free, eight-minute film played daily in an open-walled theater; and a mezzanine-level outdoor terrace with unparalleled views of Independence Mall. phlvisitorcenter.com

The refreshed galleries are divided into four sections: Belief in Afterlife, Nature and Self-Cultivation, Exchanges with the West and Order in the Imperial Court. New additions include a stunning collection of costumes and textiles, photographs and contemporary art, some on view for the first time.



Chef and owner of Zahav, winner of the James Beard Award for Best Restaurant 2019, dishes on his recent accolade, his hometown favorites and what's next for his restaurant group, CookNSolo.

- Q. The recent honor from the James Beard Foundation for Zahav is a great achievement for both you and Philadelphia. How do you think this spotlight impacts the culinary scene in the city?
- A. Thank you so much—the whole team is still celebrating! Philly has such a rich immigrant culture and so much culinary diversity to celebrate, and I think the award really helps put it on the map as an amazing food destination.
- Q. As a world traveler, what is it about Philadelphia that made you want to plant roots

- A. I spent a weekend here once over a decade ago and fell in love with the city! What I love most is the culture of support; the community is so tight-knit and encouraging.
- Q. Aside from the CookNSolo restaurants, what's your go-to Philadelphia eatery?

Wissahickor Trail

A. **Pho 75**, hands down! I go there all the time, with my business partner,

with my team, with my kids. It's my favorite spot for a meeting or for a weekend breakfast.

- Q. How about coffee? What's your preferred cafe for an early morning or mid-day cup of coffee?
- A. OX Coffee. It's a small, independent coffee spot in Queen Village. They are all about celebrating the community and working with other local businesses, and we are lucky enough to use their coffee at our newest restaurant, K'Far!
- Q. What essential Philadelphia experiences would you recommend to first-time visitors?
- A. The **Mütter Museum** is an awesome medical history museum. I also love the Wissahickon Trail for an



Q. What local "pro-tip" would you share with travelers to make the most of their visit?

A. Philly is walkable! Wear some comfy shoes and check out the city on foot. There are also so many amazing restaurants-don't commit to just one; stop by as many places as possible. Have a bite at each spot.

Q. What What's next for CookNSolo?

A. We just opened **K'Far**, our Israeli bakery and allday cafe, over the summer. We're also planning on opening two additional restaurants in the next few months: Merkaz, a pita sandwich spot, and Laser Wolf, which will be all about Israeli barbecue.

Q. What would you recommend to travelers looking to score a coveted seat at Zahav?

A. Come early or come late! We hold the chef's counter and bar for walk-ins, so if you come early and are one of the first in line, you can grab a seat there. Or if you come late, you can sneak into a bar seat!



NOW OPEN

FOR THE BIRDS

ALLING ALL BIRDWATCHERS: The all new John James Audubon Center at Mill Grove, about 30 minutes from Center City Philadelphia, offers an immersive museum and bird sanctuary on the site of the 19th-century ornithologist's home. Museum highlights include digital displays and first editions of Audubon's iconic The Birds of America and exhibits like the interactive WOW Birds! Gallery, which delves into bird habitats, traces the migratory patterns of different species through light-up maps, and more. After, head outside for prime

birdwatching along Pawlings Porch or learn about the phases of a bird's life on the kid-friendly Fledgling Trail. Step back in time by touring Audubon's historic stone farmhouse, where you'll find artifacts and original paintings from the birding pioneer. The grounds are open year-round from dawn to dusk. johnjames.audubon.org









RE-OPENING AT THE PENN MUSEUM


IG CHANGES ARE IN STORE FOR THE Penn Museum, which is in the midst of an extensive building transformation. The prestigious museum was founded in 1887 as a way to showcase findings from the University of Pennysylvania's more than 300 archaeological and anthropological expeditions around the world. On Nov. 16, 2019, the Mexico & Central America Gallery and the Africa Galleries will reopen. The former received upgrades to the wing plus dynamic new displays for visitors that span 3,000 years-from stone monuments from Belize that depict powerful kings to colorful textiles from Guatemala. The

Africa Galleries, which boasts one of the largest collections of artifacts from the continent in the United States, welcomes new interpretive exhibits and artifact displays that recreate the stories from Africa's great kingdoms and rich cultures. The reveals continue in the Main Entrance Hall, where the museum's legendary 3,000-plusyear-old Sphinx-the largest in the Western Hemisphere-will take up residence and welcome visitors to the museum. The 12.5-ton red granite icon has been off-view to the public since 2018. These reopenings follow the debut of the Middle East Galleries in 2018. penn.museum

EAT HERE NOW FOUR SEASONS DINING

Venerated Michelin-starred chef Jean-Georges Vongerichten makes his Philadelphia debut at the Four Seasons Hotel Philadelphia at Comcast Center, in the tallest building in the city. Situated on the 59th floor of the skyscraper, the French chef's eponymous fine-dining restaurant, Jean-Georges Philadelphia, boasts mirrored ceilings and 40-foot-high glass walls offering panoramic views. For a more casual experience—and exceptional city views—head to the 60th floor for the chef's JG SkyHigh. Complementing Vongerichten's refined fare is Vernick Fish, from Philadelphia's own James Beard Award-winning chef Greg Vernick, on the ground floor of the building. It has a 200-seat dining room, bar, private dining area and spacious patio. For more casual fare and coffee, try Vernick Coffee Bar in the open second-floor lobby. 

WHAT'S FREE IN PHILADELPHIA

There's no charge for checking out many of Philadelphia's top attractions from world-famous colonial landmarks to diverse works of public art to engaging science institutes. Here are just a few of the deals you'll find in the city.



VISIT THE HISTORIC MILE Independence National Historical Park (nps.gov/inde), nicknamed "America's most historic square mile," preserves

numerous important sites associated with the founding of the United States and the American Revolution.

Free, timed tickets to Independence Hall—where the Declaration of Independence and U.S. Constitution were both debated and signed—are available at the Independence Visitor Center. Visit The President's House (site of the nation's first White House from 1790 to 1800) to see the Freedom and Slavery in the Making of a New Nation exhibit. An iconic symbol of freedom, the Liberty Bell is on display in the Liberty Bell Center. Tickets are not required and access is granted 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., every day. Entrance is on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Experience making money at the source with a free, self-guided tour of the United States Mint (usmint.gov/mint_tours). Tours include a view of coining operations from 40 feet above the factory floor. Reservations are not required for this 45-minute tour, available to the public Monday through Friday.

The National Museum of American Jewish History (nmajh.org) illuminates the trials, stories and triumphs of Jewish immigrants throughout history. Visitors are able to experience the first floor at no cost, including the "Only in America Gallery" and the "Hall of Fame," which celebrates remarkable achievements by 18 American Jews, including Albert Einstein and Estée Lauder.

ENJOY THE ARTS The Kimmel Center for the Performing Arts (kimmelcenter.org) offers Free at the Kimmel indoor and outdoor concerts and workshops. The renowned Curtis Institute of Music (curtis.edu) conservatory has free admission to their student recital series.

Follow in the steps of Rocky Balboa with a morning jog up the Rocky Steps to the Philadelphia Museum of Art (philamuseum.org)—and don't forget to take your photo with Rocky's statue once you've cooled down. "Pay what you wish" at the museum on the first Sunday of every month and every Wednesday from 5 to 8:45 p.m. Free admission is also extended at The Barnes Foundation (barnesfoundation.org) the first Sunday of the month.

Visit the Fabric Workshop & Museum (fabricworkshopandmuseum.org), a free, contemporary art museum featuring work in fabrics and other materials. Browse University of Pennsylvania's Institute of Contemporary Art (icaphila.org), which has developed an international reputation as a preeminent venue for contemporary art and culture.

EXPLORE SCIENCE ATTRACTIONS The Science

History Institute (sciencehistory.org) holds an outstanding collection of chemistry-related objects, artwork, photographs and books, illustrating the impact chemistry and chemistry engineering have had on the modern world. Founded in 1855, the Wagner Free Institute of Science (wagnerfreeinstitute.org) is dedicated to providing free public education in science with the oldest program devoted to free adult education in the United States. The National Historic Landmark building houses more than 100,000 natural history specimens including fossils, shells, minerals and mounted animal skeletons and skins displayed in original wood and glass cabinets.

WONDERFUL WALKS

Premier shopping, dining, arts, entertainment and famous historic sites are all within steps of Center City hotels. Color-coded directional signs will tell

directions and answer questions.

IN THE NEIGHBORHOODS

Betsy Ross House



CONVENTION CENTER DISTRICT/CHINATOWN

nchored by the Pennsylvania Convention Center, this bustling district is also home to **Chinatown**'s authentic Friendship Gate, a gift from Philadelphia's sister city, Tianjin, China, and is the entry point for the city's new Rail Park, a scenic trail that transformed an abandoned railroad viaduct.

SEE: Snap a selfie in front of Robert Indiana's famous LOVE statue in LOVE PARK before heading across the street to DILWORTH PARK (centercityphila.org), which features special events including an outdoor ice skating rink from November to March. For 360-degree views of Philadelphia, head to the observation deck at the base of the William Penn statue atop CITY HALL (phila.gov), a Second Empire-style building adorned with Alexander Calder statues.

DO: A truly impressive display of the city's food culture, **READING TERMINAL MARKET** (readingterminalmarket.org)—America's original farmers' market—includes 80-plus diverse food vendors, from Pennsylvania Dutch baked goods to Middle Eastern specialties to local classics. Embark on an expert-led tour of the venerated market with TASTE OF PHILLY FOOD TOUR (tasteofphillyfoodtour.com), Wednesdays and Saturdays at 10 am. (Private tours are available.) Later, stroll through the PENNSYLVANIA ACADEMY OF THE FINE ARTS (pafa.org), the first art museum and school of fine arts in the country, which showcases a vast collection of 19th- and 20th-century American paintings and sculptures.

DINE: At OSTERIA (osteriaphilly.com), Italian dishes and wines are served in a modern industrial setting with an open kitchen. PSST: For great deals, don't miss happy hour. For elevated American dining (think dry-aged cowboy steak and potatoes), BANK & BOURBON (bankandbourbon.com) is unmatched.



his historic neighborhood is a must-visit for its iconic colonial sites, like the Betsy Ross House. Enjoy First Friday as dozens of hip art galleries and cool boutiques open their doors on the first Friday of every month in Old City.

SEE: Visit the AFRICAN AMERICAN MUSEUM IN PHILADELPHIA (aampmuseum.org) to see impactful exhibits like Audacious Freedom: African Americans in Philadelphia 1776-1876, which features a narrated, interactive timeline spanning 100 years and a hands-on children's corner. Delve into the city's rich maritime history at the INDEPENDENCE SEAPORT MUSEUM (phillyseaport.org). Go aboard the Olympia, an 1892 floating steel warship, and the Becuna, a World War II submarine, docked outside, before checking out River Alive, a new interactive exhibit on the Delaware River watershed.

DO: Sip your way through the city's craft beer scene with CITY BREW TOURS (citybrewtours.com), and get behind-the-scenes access and samples at some of the city's favorite breweries. Embark on a spooky, candlelit stroll through Independence National Historical Park with GHOST TOUR OF PHILADELPHIA (ghosttour.com) and discover the secrets and mysteries that haunt the city.

DINE: A global food hall in a landmark building, THE BOURSE (theboursephilly.com) offers a mix of vendors selling everything from Indian to Egyptian to home-style American dishes—plus locally made

> spirits. For Philadelphia favorites like cheesesteaks and hoagies (along with vegan and gluten-free options), visit CAMPO'S SINCE 1947 (camposdeli.com). PSST: The

deli ships its famous sandwiches across the United States (including Hawaii and Alaska).

PARKWAY MUSEUMS DISTRICT

entered around the magnificent Museum Mile on Athe Benjamin Franklin Parkway and the Fairmount neighborhood, this district is your destination for outstanding museums, like the Barnes Foundation, and plenty of Instaworthy sights.

SEE: Explore the PHILADELPHIA MUSEUM OF ART's (philamuseum.org) immense collection, which ranges from Renaissance masters to Asian ceramics to contemporary artists. After, pose for a picture with the Rocky statue at the base of its famed steps before charging up them like the fictional southpaw. The RODIN MUSEUM (rodinmuseum.org) boasts one of the largest collections of famed sculptor Auguste Rodin's works outside Paris. The Thinker greets you at the entrance

DO: For children and families with curious minds, THE FRANKLIN INSTITUTE (fi.edu) encourages visitors to discover the mysteries of the human brain, learn the mechanics of electricity, feel the forces of flight or challenge themselves in an escape room. Visit the now-defunct **EASTERN STATE PENITENTIARY** (easternstate.org) and stroll through its crumbling halls to learn about former inhabitants, including Al Capone, with an audio tour voiced by actor Steve Buscemi. PSST: The former prison, rumored to be haunted, hosts a frightening haunted house around Halloween.

DINE: Indulge in pizza with pizzazz at PIZZERIA VETRI (pizzeriavetri.com). With countless options on the menu, it's easy to find pies to satisfy the whole crew. On a chilly day, cozy up in front of the fire at TÍR NA NÓG (tirnanogphilly.com), a classic woodaccented Irish pub serving Emerald Isle standards.

RITTENHOUSE SQUARE

ocated in the heart of Center City, Rittenhouse Square is known for its green spaces, upscale shopping, charming brownstones and alfresco dining.


SEE: For panoramic views of the city, venture up to ONE LIBERTY OBSERVATION DECK (phillyfromthetop.com) on the 57th floor of the skyscraper. In addition to cameraworthy sights, you can enjoy interactive exhibits detailing noteworthy moments in Philadelphia history. The ROSENBACH MUSEUM & GARDEN (rosenbach.org) holds the private collection of the Rosenbach brothers, noted rare book dealers. Among the treasures inside: the only surviving copy of Benjamin Franklin's first Poor Richard's Almanack, Bram Stoker's notes for Dracula, the manuscript of James Joyce's Ulysses and more than 100 personal letters of George Washington.

DO: Indulge in retail therapy—clothes and shoes are tax-free in Pennsylvania—along RITTENHOUSE ROW (rittenhouserow.org), where you'll find chic boutiques and national retailers. Stroll down the AVENUE OF THE ARTS (avenueofthearts.org), the section of South Broad Street from City Hall to Lombard Street, where you'll find many of the city's top theaters, including THE KIMMEL CENTER FOR

THE PERFORMING ARTS (kimmelcenter.org), ACADEMY OF MUSIC (academyofmusic.org) and WILMA THEATER (wilmatheater.org).

DINE: Find farm-to-table fare at PUMPKIN (pumpkinphilly.com), a charming BYOB with a seasonal menu. Italian-born Chef Gianluca Demontis serves authentic Italian dishes and made-from-scratch pastas at MELOGRANO (melogranorestaurant.com), his airy BYOB eatery.





WASHINGTON SQUARE/ GAYBORHOOD/ MIDTOWN VILLAGE

ively dining spots and vibrant nightlife fill this quaint I historic neighborhood. Stroll through tree-lined Washington Square Park, or explore the charming cobblestone streets for some of Philadelphia's most photogenic views.

SEE: Another first in Philadelphia is PENNSYLVANIA HOSPITAL (pennmedicine.org), the nation's earliest hospital, founded in 1751 by Dr. Thomas Bond and Benjamin Franklin. View the oldest surgical amphitheater and medical library on a guided tour of the Pine Building.

DO: Take in a show at the WALNUT STREET THEATRE (walnutstreettheatre.org), America's oldest theater. Since 1809, the National Historic Landmark has produced popular, top-quality stage productions. The venue also caters to families with its well-curated series for kids. Delve into the pride and history of the Gayborhood with BEYOND THE BELL TOURS (beyondthebelltours.com). The alternative tour company also offers programs on local women's history, poetry and other untold stories of the city.

DINE: Local chain IRON HILL **BREWERY AND RESTAURANT's** (ironhillbrewery.com) first Center City outpost serves brewed-on-site beers and homemade fare. Philadelphia's oldest and most famous Irish pub, MCGILLIN'S OLDE ALE HOUSE (mcgillins.com) features a roaring fireplace, high-beamed ceilings and

a unique collection of innkeepers' licenses from 1860, all displayed above an antique mahogany bar.



SOUTH PHILADELPHIA

ome to the city's pro sports complex—catch the Philadelphia Eagles at Lincoln Financial Field and the 76ers and Flyers at the Wells Fargo Center—the area is also a hit thanks to its multicultural and foodie attractions.

SEE: Immerse yourself in all things Swedish—art, history, culture and science—at the AMERICAN SWEDISH HISTORICAL MUSEUM (americanswedish.org). On display is Nordic Changes: Works by Diane Burko, an artist who traveled to every continent to paint and photograph landmarks and geological phenomena. Marvel at one of the world's greatest collections of racing sports cars at the SIMEONE FOUNDATION AUTOMOTIVE MUSEUM

(simeonemuseum.org)—just voted number one car collection in the world at the National Headquarters of the Automobile Club of France. Gear heads will relish the museum's collection of more than 65 historically significant cars including Ferrari, Alfa Romeo, Bugatti and Mercedes.

DO: Started by Italian immigrants in the late 1880s, the bustling ITALIAN MARKET (italianmarketphilly.org) on 9th Street specializes in fresh meat, fruit, cheese, baked goods and more. After, wander through the eclectic SOUTH STREET HEADHOUSE DISTRICT (southstreet.com) to explore the many shops and attractions, including

Philadelphia's Magic Gardens, an immersive outdoor and indoor mosaic installation.

DINE: Visit the site of America's original cheesesteak rivalry: the corners of 9th and Passyunk in the Italian Market. Here you'll find two no-frills, walk-up counter spots, PAT'S KING OF STEAKS (patskingofsteaks.com) and GENO'S STEAKS, (genosteaks.com) both claiming to have perfected the cheesesteak.

UNIVERSITY CITY/ WEST PHILADELPHIA

hub for higher education, this neighborhood is home to top universities, including Drexel University and the University of Pennsylvania.

SEE: Embrace Japanese culture at SHOFUSO JAPANESE HOUSE AND GARDEN (japanphilly.org). The serene site includes a traditional 17th-century replica home and a beautifully landscaped garden with a koi fish pond. The PHILADELPHIA ZOO (philadelphiazoo.org), America's first, offers visitors the opportunity to view lions and Bengal tigers as they stroll overhead through a network of mesh elevated pathways.

DO: The ANNENBERG CENTER FOR THE PERFORMING ARTS (annenbergcenter.org) is a go-to for theater, dance and world-music performances. The **INSTITUTE OF CONTEMPORARY ART (icaphila.org)**

is not to be missed. Dedicated to all things new and groundbreaking in the art scene, they've hosted everyone from Andy Warhol to Cy Twombly. BONUS: Entry is free.

DINE: A pioneer in serving locally sourced, organic dishes, WHITE DOG CAFE (whitedog.com), is a whimsical mainstay situated in a trio of Victorian brownstones with dog-themed decor. Iron Chef Jose Garces's **DISTRITO** (distritorestaurant.com) serves modern Mexican small plates and cool cocktails. The eclectic decor is as big a draw as the menu—including a Volkswagen Beetle booth and hundreds of colorful masks.

ust north of Center City, these diverse neighborhoods are home to eclectic bars and restaurants, microdistilleries and popular live-music venues.


SEE: Embark on a literary pilgrimage to the EDGAR ALLAN POE NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE (nps.gov/ edal) to see the revered writer's former home, as well as exhibits dedicated to Poe and his work. RIVERS CASINO PHILADELPHIA (formerly SugarHouse Casino) offers 1,755 slot machines, 105 table games, 62 hybrid gaming seats, a 28-table poker room, a state-of-the-art Sportsbook and seven unique dining options.

DO: The area is fast becoming a destination for the city's booming craft beer and spirits scene. Tour YARDS BREWING COMPANY (yardsbrewing.com) before sampling the seasonal and signature ales on tap, including its Ales of the Revolution, which pays tribute to founding fathers. LOVE CITY BREWING (lovecitybrewing.com) in a former rail-parts factory, offers local ales and a modern tasting room with visiting food trucks. Spirits enthusiasts will enjoy a behind-the-scenes look at PHILADELPHIA

DISTILLING (philadelphiadistilling.com), maker of Bluecoat Gin. After, sip inspired mixed drinks in the modern cocktail lounge.

DINE: A relaxed restaurant and jazz bar with an urban garden, HERITAGE's (heritage.life) menu focuses on seasonal ingredients. FETTE SAU (fettesauphilly.com) is all-American barbecue joint specializing a dry-rubbed meats.





NORTHWEST PHILADELPHIA

🔼 he vibrant neighborhoods of Northwest Philadelphia feature wooded trails, historic sites and booming business districts with local shops, eateries and bars.

SEE: Survey the 16 early-American sites of HISTORIC GERMANTOWN (freedomsbackyard.com). Tour the Johnson House Historic Site, once a station stop on the Underground Railroad, learn about the Revolutionary battle fought there, discover the colonial gardens of Wyck house and more. After, tour LEST WE FORGET MUSEUM OF SLAVERY (lwfsm.com), a one-of-a-kind museum dedicated to the transatlantic slave trade. The 92-acre MORRIS ARBORETUM OF THE UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA (morrisarboretum.org) has a mix of gardens and green spaces and the 50-foot-high, kidfriendly "Out on a Limb" climbing installation. TIP: Don't miss the holiday garden railroad from Nov. 29 to Dec. 31.

DO: Take advantage of tax-free shopping at the shops and boutiques in quaint CHESTNUT HILL (chestnuthillpa.com). WOODMERE ART MUSEUM (woodmereartmuseum.org) features area artists in engaging exhibits. Don't miss Our Town: A Retrospective of Edith Neff, the first large-scale exhibition of the famous realist painter in two decades. It runs through Jan. 19.

DINE: For a dose of small-town charm, dine along MAIN STREET MANAYUNK (manayunk.com), with a mix of restaurants ranging from pizza joints to New American dinner spots to Asian BYOBs.



ACROSS THE RIVER

short drive across the Ben Franklin Bridge, New . Jersey features plenty of family-friendly attractions and discount shopping—perfect for a day trip.

SEE: BATTLESHIP NEW JERSEY MUSEUM &

MEMORIAL (battleshipnewjersey.org) is an lowa-class battleship docked on the Camden waterfront. Having served in World War II, the Korean War, Vietnam and the Gulf War, it is the most-decorated battleship in U.S. history. The interactive tour on board includes climbing up and down ladders and walking through passageways and narrow spaces, just as the ship's crew once did. Explore the ocean, the seas and its inhabitants at ADVENTURE AQUARIUM (adventureaquarium.com), home to more than 8,500 aquatic species. See more than 20 sharks swim through 550,000 gallons of water as you walk through a glass tunnel, journey to the Amazon through the interactive Piranha Falls exhibit, or spot hippos swimming around in the immersive Hippo Haven.

DO: You can save big at GLOUCESTER PREMIUM OUTLETS (premiumoutlets.com/gloucester), about a 30-minute drive from Center City Philadelphia, with deep discounts on designer and name brands like Banana Republic Factory Store, Fossil, J.Crew and Michael Kors. If shopping leaves you hungry, grab a bite to eat at one of the on-site eateries. A sports entertainment complex in

> Mount Laurel, TOPGOLF (topgolf.com) features a high-tech golf game in climatecontrolled hitting bays. Enjoyable for all ages, the sports center also offers pool tables, bars, live music and extensive food and drink menus.

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN BRIDGE, SOUTH WALKWAY

The Benjamin Franklin Bridge—which connects Philadelphia with Camden, NJ-features a pedestrian walkway on its southern side that offers beautiful views of the Philadelphia skyline and Delaware River. Visit later in the day to watch the sun set behind the skyline.

Location: Entrance at 5th and Race streets Neighborhood: Historic District/ Delaware River Waterfront

THE NAVY YARD

Found at the southern end of Broad Street, The Navy Yard is a former military shipyard now home to a variety of corporate offices. Still docked throughout the campus are a series of naval warships dubbed the "mothball fleet," offering visitors unique, up-close photo ops of cruisers, frigates, aircraft carriers and more.






JESSIE AND KATEY MURAL



Philadelphia, the first city in the United States to be designated a World Heritage City, is rich in colonial American sites.



INDEPENDENCE NATIONAL HISTORICAL

PARK is a robust collection of colonial American sites that includes Independence Hall—where the Declaration of Independence was signed and the Constitution written—and the Liberty Bell, as well as the Benjamin Franklin Museum, Franklin Court Printing Office, the Portrait Gallery in the Second Bank of the United States, Declaration House, New Hall Military Museum and more. nps.gov/inde

Situated on Independence Mall, THE PRESIDENT'S **HOUSE** marks the footprint of Presidents George Washington and John Adams's residence while in office. A prominent display tells the story of the slaves who built and worked in the house and examines the paradox of slavery and freedom in the new nation. phila.gov/presidentshouse

Site of the first Continental Congress in 1774, today CARPENTERS' HALL displays hand tools, the chairs used by founding fathers and other historic artifacts. carpentershall.org

Tour the home of reported American flag maker **BETSY** ROSS and learn about her interaction with the founding fathers—from the famed seamstress herself—on a tour of her 18th-century home. historicphiladelphia.org

Step back in time on carefully preserved **ELFRETH'S** ALLEY—the nation's oldest continuously inhabited street—lined with 32 Federal and Georgian-style homes. A museum on the block preserves the 18th-century home of a pair of dressmakers. elfrethsalley.org

The oldest learned society in the U.S., THE AMERICAN PHILOSOPHICAL SOCIETY was co-founded by Ben Franklin in 1743. Today, its museum is a treasure trove of historic items, including William Penn's 1701 Charter of Privileges, a draft of the Declaration of Independence and the chair Jefferson sat in to write it. apsmuseum.org

Founded in 1695, CHRIST CHURCH & BURIAL GROUND on 2nd and Market streets was the place of worship for numerous founding fathers. Benjamin Franklin's tomb can be found in the church's burial ground. christchurchphila.org
