



Spanish Governor's Palace



A National Historic Landmark, the Spanish Governor's Palace is the single remaining relic of the Presidio San Antonio de Béjar. Constructed in 1749, the palace represents over 260 years of Spanish settlement in Texas. It features 18th century living and working quarters, Spanish colonial artifacts and an original Habsburg keystone, signifying Spanish settlement under King Ferdinand VI.

Visit to learn more about the historical significance of the Spanish Governor's Palace and to experience 18th century living.

In 1977, the Conquistador statue was given to the people of San Antonio by the Spanish government.
