

THE BLITHEWOLD STORY

In 1896, coal baron, Augustus Van Wickle and his wife Bessie purchased the property for a summer retreat away from their home in Hazleton, Pennsylvania. The beauty and location of the site made it the perfect place to pursue the family's love of the sea and Bessie's passion for horticulture. With her eye for design and plant



knowledge, Bessie oversaw the placement of almost every tree, garden, and structure on the grounds.

Her elder daughter, Marjorie, inherited her mother's love of gardening and grew thousands of plants for her gardens including seedlings from Blithewold's Giant Sequoia. She corresponded with some of the most renowned botanists of the day. Blithewold's voluminous archives contain journals, letters, and thousands of photographs that paint a detailed picture of life on the estate during the last

Marjorie Lyon had the foresight to understand what an invaluable legacy she was leaving when upon her death in 1976, she bequeathed Blithewold to the public for their enjoyment, education, and inspiration.

That legacy has continued to inspire the thousands who visit Blithewold each year.
