





### HYDE HALL HISTORY

Hyde Hall was built by George Clarke (1768–1835), whose great-grandfather (also named George Clarke) served the British Crown as a colonial administrator prior to the American Revolution. As lieutenant governor of the province of New York, the first George Clarke amassed an American estate of 120,000 acres before he returned to England.

Young George Clarke inherited these lands in 1777 at the age of eight. In 1806, Clarke emigrated from England to America, settling first in Albany. In 1817 he purchased 340 acres on the shores of Otsego Lake.

Clarke took an active role in the design of his new home. He commissioned Albany's celebrated architect, Philip Hooker, to draw up the plans. Hooker had designed the original New York State Capitol building, Albany City Hall, and many other public buildings. Hyde Hall is Hooker's grandest domestic creation and a rare surviving example of his work.

Located at the center of the Clarke agricultural empire with lands in New York State, England, and Jamaica, Hyde Hall became Clarke's American family seat. Construction began in 1817 on the Jamaican-inspired Stone Cottage, the family's living quarters. Next came a kitchen and servants' wing (1818-1824), and finally the Great House, with its grand public rooms, finished in 1833. These surround a central courtyard and completed Clarke's vision of his fifty-room country mansion.

Hyde Hall contained technological innovations such as an imported water closet, a ducted heating system to the Great Rooms, and vapor light chandeliers. When Clarke died in 1835, construction on the Mansion ceased, although other buildings, the home farm, orchards, and gardens were added by subsequent generations.

Hyde Hall remained in the Clarke family until 1963, when it was acquired by New York State for the development of Glimmerglass State Park. Today this National Landmark structure is a New York State Historic Site operated by Hyde Hall Inc. as a house museum and regional cultural center.
