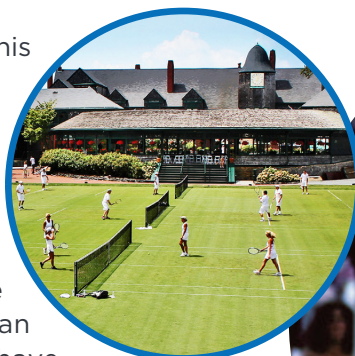
Serena Williams wore these gold sneakers during her win over Venus Williams to claim the 2002 French Open Women's Singles Championship.

Björn Borg was thought to have ice in his veins, but there was no denying the fire in his belly as he claimed 11 major titles in just seven years. His charisma propelled the popularity of the sport and inspired a generation of tennis fans.

THE ULTIMATE HONOR IN TENNIS

Over 250 individuals in tennis history have received the honor of induction into the International Tennis Hall of Fame, representing achievement in the sport at the highest possible level. Many earned a place through raw talent, incomparable determination, and remarkable athletic feats. Others for major contributions to the development and promotion of the sport. All have gone above and beyond in their commitment to tennis, and have inspired a love for the sport in fans around the world.

The induction class is announced in January and honored with a year-long tribute exhibit in the museum.

The celebration culminates with the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony during Enshrinement Weekend in July.

THE LEGENDS OF TENNIS

25,000 ARTIFACTS 250+ HALL OF FAMERS

Don't let the unassuming storefront in downtown Newport fool you. As soon as you wander through the arched entryway and see the historic grass tennis courts and architecture, you'll be transported to a different time and a spectacular place.

The International Tennis Hall of Fame is housed in the Newport Casino, built in 1880. It began as a social club for the East Coast elite who summured by the sea. One year later, the sprawling seven-acre property was home to the first U.S. National Championships—now called the US Open.



WORLD'S LARGEST COLLECTION OF TENNIS MEMORABILIA



From the birth of tennis in 12th-century Europe through the champions of today, you'll get a unique perspective on how tennis evolved. How its personalities influenced fashion, culture, and society. How they changed the world.

The Newport Casino was the first major design by McKim, Mead & White and is a stunning example of American Shingle Style architecture. It was designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1987.
